

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Phone Policy Feedback Highlights - Parents

Less than a quarter of the parents who responded had a negative view:

- My son is a freshman so we're brand new to this policy. I haven't noticed any complaints or hardships not having his phone out during class hours. I support the phone ban moving forward.
- I 100% believe this is a positive step forward with enhancing our classroom experience. Also I am hopeful that this will help with less distractions in class, less issues with bullying, coordination of fights, students meeting in bathroom for who knows what, and recording of fights and bad behavior. I am excited to see how this improves our students test scores and grades. It is a lil different to not be able to call or text my child, but I will figure out how to work around it.
- I was on campus two days the first week and the students as a whole are actually socializing, behaving, engaging with each other. My kids come home with more feedback or stories about their day, they are engaging with their teachers, are comprehending instructions better because they aren't as distracted or rushing back to their phones.
- Me parece perfecto la nueva política sobre los teléfonos . Así los estudiantes ponen más atención en clase.
- I think this allows my children to focus on what is most important which is school and social interaction.
- The fact that they have to actually engage with others instead of Tik Tok, IG, and rumor spreading. It cuts down potential arguments or fights as well.
- My child isn't constantly texting me
- Love knowing that most kids will be off their phones, interacting with each other instead
- No texts from daughter saying she wants to go home
- **Personal favorite**: Not getting sent TikTok links from my daughter during work hours has been a blessing.

Phone Policy Feedback Highlights - Students

This was a more critical group, but they still had their positives:

- During class i have found that time goes by faster so maybe I'm trippin.
- Talking. there is a lot more talking and people are less selfish
- I'm just not on my phone as much and people seem to be more alive
- It has kept people more interactive with each other.
- It's been positive because I'm not constantly on my screen.
- I've had more social interactions, and have made more friends.
- I feel like teachers are able to control class better which speeds up the work as they aren't getting mad at random students.
- I'm paying attention more since my phone has been in my bag and not in my pockets.
- My phone hasn't been dead by the end of the day.
- I'll take the bonding as a win: The only positive experience I have gotten from this policy is bonding with peers about how much we dislike it and the inconvenience which it causes.

Phone Policy Feedback - Staff

All but two staff response reported better or much better. No one rated it worse.

- More students are forced to pay attention. There are less "groups" visiting the bathroom together. Students are actually talking to each other at lunch! Overall a much calmer campus.
- Happy that everyone is trying hard to make sure we enforce this new policy. It will only work if we all follow through the process. It's a tough change, but in the end, it will benefit our students and staff.
- It's been great! I don't have to fight over having to have students put away, first warning, second warning... The students know exactly what is expected of them the moment they walk into my class. Lets just say students are not distracted like they were before.
- Students are not taking out their phones on campus that I can see and also not in my office. They are paying more attention to things to life in front of them rather than on the cell phone.
- I have had shockingly little push back from freshmen and sophomores. When a student had attempted to use their phone in class, the policy and steps were clear and easily enforced. It is such a HUGE relief to have strong admin support and cooperation from other teachers. I feel empowered to stay strong on the phones.
- The energy in the classroom is so positive. Students are finding ways to problem solve without phones and are engaging with each other in positive ways. The classroom feels alive!
- Increased student engagement and appropriate social engagement. less noise. Decrease in students wondering buildings during class time.
- GAME CHANGER! Wonderful. A whole new world. This has been amazing and my students are responding positively. No more distractions. Students are highly engaged and paying attention and learning. They needed this structure and boundary to make it ok to not respond to messages on their phone from friends during class. Being able to say, "NO!" for me as or me as a teacher is what has been missing, Knowing that we are all on board changer.

Phones - Off and away, all day.

Rosemont High School campus policy requires that cell phones and ear buds are off and away the entire school day. Away means in bags or backpacks and not in pockets or visible. Why? Well, our school community can provide a lot, A LOT, in the way of stories from personal experience: Distractions in the classroom, contributing to lack of engagement, cyber-bulling, rushes of students filming potential conflicts, coordinating illicit activities, etc. They have interfered with student safety and learning on our campus.

Electronic device policies are difficult to enforce without coordinated supports and large scale buy in. We are on board with this, we have heard from parents who are on board with this. We need your support. Our staff will be here to support during the transition and will be able to reach your student if you need. Our office number is 916-395-5130. Please limit calls to as needed, to ensure that we are available to meet your needs.

Students will have infractions documented in the Infinite Campus contact log. Beginning with the second infraction, student phones will be held to the end of the school day. Each infraction after, the phone will be returned to the parent/guardian upon meeting with an administrator.

Here are just some of the statistics out there:

- Students whose smartphones were physically removed during class had higher levels of course comprehension, lower levels of anxiety, and higher levels of mindfulness. (<u>Link</u>)
- 72% of high school teachers say cell phone use is a major problem. More that lack of interest in learning, more than getting up and walking around, and more than students being disrespectful (<u>Link</u>)
- Smartphone and social media use are linked to increases in mental distress, selfinjurious behavior and suicidality (greatest among girls), negative effect on self-view, increase in negative interactions and cyberbullying, normalizing self-harm, chronic sleep deprivation.
